Together, we will engage, encourage, and empower our community.



2020 Fiscal Statement



Fundraising

On October 5, 2019, Holly Hill welcomed over 130 guests to An Evening of Hopes & Dreams at the Metropolitan Club in Covington, KY. Thank you to all who attended and volunteered. An Evening of Hopes

Behavioral Health Services

Our qualified mental health professionals partner with children, youth, and young adults, up to 24 years of age, and their families to provide services in the home, at school, or our office to help improve the quality of life for everyone involved. In FY 2020, 598 children, 1,773 family members, and 840 other supports were served.

Simon's Story

Simon was referred to Holly Hill after struggling with the trauma of losing his friend to gun violence. At the time of referral, he had been placed in an alternative school due to his struggle with aggression. He received a comprehensive assessment and was admitted into outpatient services attending weekly group. It was also recommended for Simon to participate in Targeted Case Management (TCM). While in the group, he experienced more outside stressors, struggles with the legal system, and became suicidal. The team was able to support him and his mother and work to have him hospitalized.

Simon returned from the hospital and was admitted into our Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) where he opened up about prior childhood traumas and other issues he was experiencing at home. He continued to express struggles, but with increased insight and motivation to make changes, he was able to identify future areas of hope and direction. Simon excelled in the program often encouraging others to "work hard and keep at it".

In the completion of IOP, Simon successfully returned to his home school, completed his diversion that was required from the court system, and demonstrated emotional regulation skills. With his mother by his side he identified new goals he wanted to accomplish. He continues to be served in our outpatient services and case management services for additional support and wraparound of services.









Residential Treatment


A licensed Private Child Care 24-bed facility and treatment program for adolescent girls ages 11 to 17 with emotional and/or behavioral problems who are committed to the state's foster care system. This program provides individual and group therapy, family counseling, psychiatric consultation and assessment, and a highly structured 24-hour supervised group living in two residential cottages. Residents attend public school and receive educational support services at the on-site classroom.

Program Highlights




- Due to the high probability of children aging out of the state foster care system becoming homeless, we have increased focus on integrating age appropriate life skills.
- 72% of residents are from the 12 county Northern Kentucky Bluegrass Region, and 18% are from other counties within Kentucky.

- Increased and intensified informed trauma care training with direct care staff and the use of effective behavioral interventions.
- Holly Hill is committed to the Building Bridges Initiative to ensure that youth have a voice, services are family and youth driven, and committed to supporting youth in the community.

39 adolescent girls were served in FY 2020 with an average length stay of **115 days**




